

Rondout, New York - West Strand Historic District

The **Rondout–West Strand Historic District** is located on the shore of Rondout Creek along the southern boundary of the city of Kingston, New York, United States. Formerly Rondout, New York, it is bounded by the creek, Broadway, Hone, Ravine and McEntee streets, an area of 570 acres (2.3 km²) containing 259 buildings, most dating to the 19th century. US 9W and the John T. Loughran Bridge are immediately to the east; the Kingston-Port Ewen Suspension Bridge crosses the creek to the west. The neighborhood is often referred to locally by either of the two names.

The name of the Rondout Creek comes from the fort, or redoubt, that was erected near its mouth. The Dutch equivalent of the English word redoubt (meaning a fort or stronghold), is *reduyt*. In the Dutch records of Wildwyck, however, the spelling used to designate this same fort is invariably *Ronduyt* during the earliest period, with the present form *rondout* (often capitalized) appearing as early as November 22, 1666. The word could also be broken down into its components and translated, literally, "round-out." However, it seems unlikely that the inhabitants of Esopus had any special meaning in mind when they corrupted the Dutch word *reduyt* into *ronduyt* and *rondout*. Most likely, this corrupting process merely represented the simplification of a word (*reduyt*).

The Strand (original pronunciation, in Dutch: "*strunt*"). Strand means, in Dutch, a shore or beach. The street running along the north shore of the Rondout Creek near its mouth has always been called "The Strand," or, more recently, "Strand Street" (East and West).



A short, easily navigable distance up the creek from the Hudson River, the area, originally known as Kingston Landing, had always been an ideal location for a harbor. But it was not until the establishment of the Delaware and Hudson Canal in 1828 made it a key junction for coal being shipped from Northeast Pennsylvania and bluestone being quarried from the nearby Catskill Mountains that it was able to fully take advantage of that situation. It grew so rapidly that it incorporated as the Village of Rondout in 1849. By 1872 it grew so much more it merged with the then-Town of Kingston to form today's city. By the time the canal closed in 1899, it had acquired buildings in all 19th-century architectural styles.

The industrial base established was such that the neighborhood remained prosperous long after the closing of the canal. But by the 1960s it had, like similar areas in many other American cities, fallen into decay, and it was only when urban renewal and the construction of the bridge led to the demolition of part of the neighborhood that efforts to preserve the remainder were seriously undertaken.

It was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1979; the city has recognized it in its ordinances as well. Today, the area is still an active waterfront, although it primarily sees recreational traffic. Many small boutiques and restaurants have opened in the old buildings along the streets; it has become a popular destination for visitors both by land and water. It is located adjacent to the West .

Colonial era

The early Dutch settlers realized the value of the creek for their colonial ambitions. However, the

contention that a trading post or fort was established at the mouth of the Rondout in the early part of the 17th century is thoroughly debunked in Marc B. Fried's *The Early History of Kingston and Ulster County, NY*, pp.3-14 and 155-61. The first non-Native structure at this location was undoubtedly the house of settler Christoffel Davits in 1653, and a fort was built here by the colonial government in 1660. The local Native Americans likewise frequented the area. In 1652, an Englishman, Thomas Chambers, became the first to acquire a land deed from the Indians, nearby, along the Esopus Creek (which has a vast expanse of good farmland), and thus began the genesis of present-day Kingston. The Rondout's role in the area's early settlement was as a port for the settlement that was made along the Esopus Creek [The Early History of Kingston, chapter 2]

Settlement did slowly progress inland, but it was not until well after American independence that the Rondout would become economically important. In the early 1820s two Philadelphia businessmen realized the immense profits that could be made if they could find a way to get the mostly unmined high-quality anthracite coal from undeveloped Northeastern Pennsylvania to the lucrative markets of New York City. Railroads had not yet been perfected, so they saw the possibility of a canal running from Honesdale, Pennsylvania, to the Hudson at what was then the village of Rondout. In

1828 they obtained a charter for their company to do this, and the Delaware and Hudson Canal was opened a few years later. Coal was transferred from canal barges to river ships at Rondout, and it became a boomtown quickly. The canal remained

a prosperous operation until late in the 19th century when rail transportation finally became more affordable, and ended its days in 1904 after a brief period carrying Rosendale cement.[9] The former terminal port area for the canal is now Kingston's Rondout-West Strand Historic District, listed on the National Register of Historic Places.



The Building

OLE SAVANNAH is located on the Historic Rondout at 100 Rondout Landing. The building is part of the former Cornell Steamboat Company shops. The Cornell Steamboat Company was the dominating towing company on the Hudson from 1880 to the 1930's. The building was a "boiler shop". Boilers for the ships were both built and repaired at this sight, which is located directly on Rondout Creek.

Rondout is the river port of the city of Kingston, which was incorporated in 1872. Rondout was established by the Dutch in the seventeenth century as an Indian trading post. The Rondout village was situated on the Hudson at the mouth of the Rondout Creek. The creek empties into the Hudson through a large, protected tidal area. Prior to it's incorporation, it was known as The Strand, Kingston Landing and Bolton (in honor of the president of the Delaware & Hudson Canal Co.)



Finley Lawson, winner of the Westbury Mayor's traditional Christmas card design competition, was chosen to switch on the Christmas lights. Hundreds of residents gathered for the big -on and enjoyed an evening of spectacular entertainment as part of a program of seasonal fun.

This year's Westbury Model Railway Show – the 19th put on by The West Wiltshire Gauge 0 Group – was again successful with over 200 people attending, commenting on how pleasant and variable the show was.

A seven year old boy was travelling in a lorry with his dad when they were involved in a collision with a car on the A350 Westbury, Wiltshire at the end of October. He drew a heart-breaking drawing to thank the firefighters who helped him.

Three years later, on November 29th, 1958, they were married. They decided to move to Westbury in 1967, where they have lived ever since.

Westbury Infants School announced that the school would be closed December 7th due to a suspected outbreak of norovirus. Non-uniform day (with a donation for the tombola) will now take place on December 10th. Christmas performances and craft markets next week will NOT be affected and WILL continue as planned.

Children at Westbury Junior School have been using brand new iPads to enhance their learning after the 22 tablets were donated to the school by housing association Sovereign.



Pupils from Westbury Leigh C of E Primary School have been busy making Roman mosaics with a local artist. Year 4 class were recently visited by artist Joanna Dewfall who specializes in mosaic art. Each child had the opportunity to make their very own Roman themed coaster

which they designed themselves. All children were taught how to cut each tile in to different shapes such as rectangles, squares, triangles and circles. Some children created motif designs whilst others created repeating patterns.

Over 15,000 shoeboxes were shipped from Westbury before Christmas for Operation Christmas Child, who send shoeboxes full of presents to impoverished children around the world.

Westbury and the surrounding villages celebrate older people at a special event on January 21st at The Laverton from 10 a.m. The event, free to Westbury community residents aged 65+, will feature information, entertainment and lunch in partnership with Age UK and Wiltshire Council.

Fake £50 notes are being used in the Westbury area. Suspects will often attend in a small group and purchase a low valued item. Wiltshire police have urged anyone to take note of the people that may be using these notes and any vehicles they may be driving.

Westbury Heritage Society will be treated to an illustrated whistle stop tour through time, exploring how the town would have been policed, justice administered and punishment meted out. The talk - "It's A Fair Cop!" - takes place at the Methodist church in Station Road on January 29th.

Staff at Westbury Mercedes-Benz Vans and Trucks Dealer Group, Rygor Commercials, has chosen their charities to support in 2019. This year the Rygor team will be fundraising for Hope for Tomorrow, Dorothy House Hospice Care and Wiltshire Air Ambulance.

The Barnardo's store in Palomino Place, Westbury Leigh, has enjoyed some of its busiest weeks of

Year four pupils at Westbury Leigh Primary School were recently visited by Wessex Water to help with their topic on rivers. Children learned about the water cycle, the role of Wessex Water, the use of rivers, where tap water comes from and how we clean water.

Lucas Wint, of Westbury, has so far raised more than £700 for the cancer unit where his friend's beloved gran is receiving treatment. Lucas was determined to run the 5K Bowerhill Bomber race on February 3 but the event was snowed off and cancelled. Undeterred by the icy conditions, family friend Tom Reynolds took Lucas out and they ran their own race around Westbury, covering over 6.5k. Hearing about Lucas's determination, the Bowerhill Bomber race organizers offered to take Lucas around the 5k route once the snow and ice cleared. A week later Adam Firks, of Redfish Events, which organizes the race, ran the very muddy route with Lucas, enabling him to complete his personal challenge in an impressive 26.5 minutes - and to be the only 2019 runner to receive a medal.




Darrell J. Cogswell, 72, died Dec. 31, 2018, at his home in Delta, CO.



For those of you coming to the 2019 CFA Reunion in Nova Scotia, you should be aware of the following:

Visitors to Canada must hold a valid passport with at least six months remaining before its expiration. Visitors from visa-exempt countries (with the exception of the US) are required to purchase an electronic travel authorization (eTA, \$7), similar to the USA's ESTA visa-waiver, before departing their home country. Visitors from non-visa waiver countries must apply for the appropriate visa, prior to arriving in Canada. Once you arrive in Canada, the border officer will ask you a few questions about the purpose and length of your visit. Questioning may be more intense at land border crossings and your car may be searched. Once the immigration officer has verified your passport, eTA/Visa and travel plans, you'll go through customs.



For updates (particularly regarding land border crossing rules), check the websites for the US State Department (www.travel.state.gov) and Citizenship & Immigration Canada (www.cic.gc.ca).

Having a criminal record of any kind, including any drunk-driving related charges, may keep you out of Canada. If this affects you, be sure to contact the Canadian embassy or consulate in your home country.

Cogswells in Nova Scotia History:



Cogswell, Henry Hezekiah:

(1776-1854): Cogswell was born in Cornwallis Township. He went on to become a lawyer with a practice at Halifax. Moving into politics, he represented the town of Halifax in the legislature from 1818 to 1820. Cogswell was

the first president of the Halifax Banking Company, Nova Scotia's first bank. It was incorporated by the merchants of Halifax, led by Samuel Cunard and Enos Collins in 1825. It was also known as Cogswell's Bank. It evolved into one of the major banks of Canada, Imperial Bank of Canada. His other activities included being president of the Albion Fire and Life Insurance Company and of the Annapolis Iron Mining Company. In 1831, Cogswell was named to the province's Council.


