

The Greatest Historical Lineage of All Time

As children, the least of all thoughts in our minds was our genealogical lines. We knew family existed because we had our parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts and uncles and, of course, cousins. But we never took the time to figure out what and who was beyond our families and back into history.

Our parents often didn't take the time to teach us either when we did think to ask questions of who we were and where we descended from. As Christmas nears, it is important to remind ourselves what must be the "Greatest Historical Lineage of All Time".

But from the beginning of time as found in the Bible, genealogical history was recorded. I remember it well as who "begat" who from Adam and Eve on down through Biblical genealogical history of families. Abram and Sarai became the beginning lineage of the Jewish peoples when God promised Abram that he would be the father, the progenitor of a great nation. God changed their names to Abraham and Sarah.

The Jewish people have been the greatest recorders of genealogical history. The only times when these recordings have been almost invisible is when nations and other religions tried to obliterate the Jewish genealogical history by forcing them to change their religion and their names in whatever country they were residing in. This was a very evident point of history during the reign of Queen Isabella and King Ferdinand. The reign of these two enforced an edict in which those who were not of their faith must submit and convert or die. Hence, many names were changed and temporarily lost, but regained in later generations of the family.

Now the greatest lineage recorded is that of Jesus Christ. God named him and the lineage from



which he would be descended. This lineage is found in Matthew, Chapter 1. The generations were from Abraham to Isaac, Isaac to Jacob, Jacob to Judas, Judas to Phares, Phares to Esrom, Esrom to Aram, Aram to Aminidab, Aminidab to Naasson, Naasson to Salmon, Salmon to Boaz. Boaz to Obed (of Ruth), Obed to Jesse, Jesse to David the King, David to Solomon, Solomon to Roboam, Roboam to Abia, Abia to Asa, Asa to Josaphat, Josaphat to Joram, Joram to Ozias, Ozias to Joatham, Joatham to Achaz, Achaz to Ezekias, Ezekias to Manasses and on down 15 more generations to Joseph. Joseph was chosen by God to be the earthly father and Mary the earthly vessel, a virgin, whereupon Jesus would be born.

All the generations from Abraham to David were 14, from Jechonias to the carrying away into Babylonia 14 generations and from the Babylonian captivity to Jesus Christ was 14 generations. With this total of 42 generations, God deemed genealogical history important, and so should we.

Our generations throughout history are intertwined throughout the world. We have been born, raised, settled, moved, settled and moved again, raising the need to know who we are and where we came from. Family names have been changed and reclaimed according to where we have lived and thrived. Genealogy and family searches are never ending. So to our Cogswell genealogy, we must search and verify, search and verify to truly know our familial history.

Bathurst (New South Wales) Branch of the Red Cross president **Vivien Cogswell** says it looks like the group's future has been secured for the moment after an appeal for help. Members of the branch — which was formed in Bathurst in 1914 — went public with their concerns in June, saying new faces and new blood were needed to keep the group going.

In an episode of Mike Rowe's online series "Returning the Favor," Rowe surprises **Justin Cogswell** with a new warehouse for Operation Build Up. Back in January, Cogswell faced a battle with the town over zoning code violations for vehicles at Cogswell's garage for his community initiative called "Operation Build Up" -- a veterans group that fixes up old cars to give them away.

Tyler Cogswell is moving on from the Cincinnati Bearcats who are going to need to find a new starting tight end. Cogswell was never a dominant pass-catching threat, but he had a career-year in 2017 with 23 receptions, including two scores. He had a total of seven catches combined in his first three years on campus.

Emma Osmond, manager of Cygnets Pre-School, which organized the event, said, "The picnic was one of several events organised to help familiarise the children with 'big school' and was a great success."



Trowbridge Cycling Club and Westbury Wheelers joined forces with Wiltshire Police for the Ride for Awareness of Cyclists Safety event. The groups were joined by police chief constable Kier Pritchard, among others, for the ride, which started and

finished at Trowbridge Town Park.

Students at Matravers School who have reading difficulties such as dyslexia will benefit from new technology to help their learning after a donation of £1,700 from Westbury Lions. The donation has enabled the school to purchase a set of C-Reader pens, a pen scanner which reads text out loud and also has a built in dictionary for those who struggle with reading.

The coastguard has winched a paraglider from a steep hillside after a crash in Westbury. Emergency services, including Wiltshire Air Ambulance, were called to the scene at the White Horse at around 7.30 pm this evening following reports of



an aircraft crash. The paraglider suffered spinal injuries. After being winched to safety, he was taken to hospital by land ambulance.

Vanessa Jenkins, 36, of Westbury, had her hair cut off and donated to the Little Princess Trust charity who make wigs for young children who have lost their hair through illness.



Westbury sprinter Will Kennedy scorched to double gold in the South West Inter Counties Track & Field Championships at the Exeter Arena. The 20-year-old won both the senior men's 100m and 200m events on a red-hot day in Devon, although

blustery wind conditions weren't entirely conducive to fast times leaving Kennedy only moderately happy with his times of 11.06 seconds and 22.61 seconds respectively. "The performances weren't great but I guess the wins were the main thing," said Kennedy, a former student at Matravers School.

Westbury Leigh Primary School held their sports day on 21st June with great success. Lots of families came and took part in the family picnic over lunchtime. Students completed a range of activities in their year groups from the fancy dress race to the standing long jump.

Tara Shergold was watching her daughter Amilee slide toy cars down the skate ramp at Penleigh Park in Westbury when her hands touched the surface and instantly blistered. She also grazed her knees, suffering deep friction burns.

Michael Edwards, of Westbury, and his son Joe were in their house on Monday when an electrical fault caused the fire in the shower unit. The pair has been left without proper washing facilities, and believes the smell left by the fire is making their home unliveable. Mr. Edwards, who suffers from epilepsy and his son, who has type one diabetes, have had

numerous issues with the shower during the eight years they have lived there, but say nothing has been done to solve the problems.

Archaeologist and television presenter Julian Richards helped Westbury locals to tidy and restore the town's Quakers burial ground. They have discovered the graves of John Matravers (which was partly made of marble) and his wife Susanna, dating back to the 1700's. This was the ancestor of John Matravers, who left £1,000 in his will to set up the original school many years after he died in the 1700's.

A fire engine worth £500,000 was overturned and wrecked after being hit by a lorry in Westbury Sept. 19th. South Western Ambulance Service say two people have been treated for minor injuries.

Mr. Jones, 50, is raising more than £6,000 to establish a foundation that will help support bereaved children after he has died. He has been diagnosed with malignant hypertension, a terminal illness that attacks the heart and internal organs. He has suffered from the condition for the past eight years and has had numerous health scares which have resulted in him receiving electric shock treatment to re-start his heart. He left for Nepal Oct 19th and was expecting to return to the UK in mid-November following the 22-day trip. By Nov. 1st they had reached the base camp.

For months volunteers from the history group, members of the church, members of the Woolie Wednesday knitting club and Emma Symonds and her knitters at EJ Crafts have been busy with their needles and have knitted thousands of poppies to be used in the display.

Young musical talent was on display at Matravers School Oct. 25th at the annual Young Musician of the Year Awards. Sponsored by Westbury Lions, the evening saw pupils of all ages perform in front of local musicians who had volunteered to be judges. Performances ranged from duets, trios, bands, orchestras and choirs and included songs such as Just the Way You Are, sung by the Harmonize vocal group.

Army cadets from Westbury were part of 150-strong contingent from Wiltshire who travelled to the Somme battlefield in France as part of a social history project and to commemorate the end of the First World War and local men who died in the War.

Nine year old Tymoteusz Naskretski from Westbury took it upon himself to mark 100 years since the armistice of World War One in a creative way, as he wrote his own poem to express his thoughts on the day, and to honour soldiers who fought in World War One.

Pupils from The Mead Community Primary School have been using the popular traditional tale as the basis of their learning over recent weeks, covering subjects such as science, design technology and English. They took the classroom outside as they visited Barratt Homes' new development in Westbury to find out what it takes to build a 'wolf-proof' house. During their visit to White Horse View the five and six-year-olds were shown one of the five-star housebuilder's finished products before being given a tour of the new development. They got to see homes at various stages of construction They were able to see some of the machinery required to build homes, including diggers and cranes.

Cogswell Tavern Turned Home in Connecticut

Washington, CT—Most people in town probably already know the story of the white Colonial known as Cogswell Tavern, where George Washington once ate breakfast nearly three centuries ago.

The tavern-turned-home will be one of five featured next weekend in the Washington Environmental Council's House and Farm Tour, a scholarship fundraiser that will let residents visit and learn about significant properties throughout towns.

"I think, like all of us, many people wonder what's behind (Cogswell) doors," Karen Silk, one of the council's directors, said. "We thought that would be the linchpin because it is such a famous house."

The tour will let attendees visit the homes in any order and talk with council representatives at each property.

At Cogswell Tavern, they can see many of the site's original features that have been maintained since it was used as a rest stop for

travelers in the 18th and 19th centuries.

Paula Krinsky, whose family has been close friends with the owner's family for generations, will be on hand to discuss the home's expansive history. Krinsky had helped the family sort through a collection of artifacts and papers found in the attic during a restoration in the early 2000s.

"Like typical New Englanders, they never threw anything out," Krinsky said. "They had unbelievable

Point, which is noted in Washington’s diary.

“Anna Whittlesey Cogswell was about to sit down for breakfast when a rider came and said General Washington is on his way and that she would have to feed 300 troops,” said Sally Woodroffe, who lives in the home and is an eighth-generation descendent of Cogswell.

The fireplace that Cogswell likely used to cook for

treasures up there.”

The tavern was built in 1756 by Major William Cogswell, who served with Gen. George Washington in the Revolutionary War and was one of New Preston’s first settlers. Cogswell bought the property from Chief Waramaug, a prominent Native American leader at the time.

Cogswell was a justice of the peace, a selectman in New Milford, a member of the 1774 Committees of



guests can still be seen when entering the home, along with antique pots and a Revolutionary War musket hanging above it. It is believed the floors, ceilings and other features in the house are part of the original structure.

Krimsky and Woodroffe said family stories attribute the home to other brushes with history — including as a stop on the underground railroad — though it is difficult to confirm many of the exact details.


